

History Corner - Kewaunee's Early Maritime History

(This is the earliest reference to the Lighthouse I have found so far, in the local paper archives.)

From the Kewaunee Enterprise 8/3/1859

APPROPRIATION FOR LIGHT HOUSES ON

THE LAKES._ government has made appropriations for Light Houses on the Lakes as follows:

New York—For a beacon light on one of the Sister's Islands, in the St. Lawrence River, below Alexandria Bay, four thousand dollars. For repairing and securing the pier connected with the lighthouse at Oswego, so as to prevent the destruction of said lighthouse, ten thousand dollars.

Michigan—For a lighthouse on the north point of the peninsula dividing Grand Traverse Bay, six thousand dollars.

For a lighthouse on the east side of Middle island harbor, West Marquette, five thousand dollars.

To repair the lighthouse pier at Vermillion, Ohio, five thousand dollars.

Wisconsin—For a lighthouse on Green Island, or one of the adjacent islands. Green Bay, six thousand dollars.

For a lighthouse on Raspberry island, One of the Apostle Islands, Lake Superior, six thousand dollars.

For a lighthouse at the mouth of the Kewaunee River, Lake Michigan, six thousand dollars.

Minnesota—For a lighthouse at or near the south of Two Island River, Lake Superior, five thousand dollars.
